Many of our members have been active in attending historical celebrations across the State and region including: grave marking at President James Madison's grave site at Montpelier, wreath laying commemorating those in the militia (which later became the 29<sup>th</sup> Division) who died at the Battle of Point Pleasant, 1774, wreath laying at the grave site of Thomas Nelson and parade at Yorktown as we celebrated the final victory of the Revolutionary War. Various VASSAR Color Guard activities are too numerous to mention.

I urge all our members to become actively involved in not only the many historic celebrations, but the various committees awarding youth, public servants, citizens and educators within our communities. Our Chapter, while very active, relies on the hard work of an active small group of men. It is through your active participation in Chapter meetings and activities that we can truly demonstrate to our communities the principles our ancestors fought so valiantly to defend.

## Awards Night and Installation

**Chief Homer Johns, McLean and Great Falls Fire Department-Fire Safety Commendation Award. With Mr. Jorge Canovis, his assistant, pinning the award**



- Without special attention to educating children, we would lose the opportunity to mentor proper fire safety to a new generation. This is but one thing Chief Johns has accomplished as a volunteer fire fighter since the 1960's. Chief Johns pursued and has supported a Fire Safety House, which is a two level house that gives children a chance to experience a simulated fire-like condition in a controlled home environment. In the ten years of service more than 12,000 children in the Metropolitan area have benefited from this educational tool. Washington Metropolitan area is one of only fourteen metropolitan areas in the U.S. to have such a learning tool. For this outstanding contribution to the communities and his faithful service throughout the last 40 years he is awarded the Fire Safety Medal.

Captain James A. Morris-Law Enforcement Commendation Medal. with wife Mary Beth doing the honors



- Captain James A. Morris is a 14 year veteran with the Fairfax County Police Department and Commander of the Franconia District Police Station, Cpt. Morris has greatly improved the level of law enforcement delivered in his community. From the outreach initiatives such as the youth soccer program with area schools to chairing the Springfield Revitalization Taskforce, and to providing VDOT and Virginia State Police assistance in coordinating numerous contractors and having backup plans for traffic flow in the "mixing bowl" project. His assistance with the Citizen Advisory Council has provided impetus to the graffiti abatement program from the Franconia District neighborhoods. If this was not enough, Captain Morris organized an event (bike ride from Ground Zero to the Pentagon-288 miles) designed to honor the many Public servants who tragically died on September 11<sup>th</sup> which raised over \$500,000 for the INOVA Fairfax Hospital Trauma Center. It was through Captain Morris' ability to make a favorable impression on others and gain their acceptance that led to the development and subsequent execution of this highly successful event.

- **Second Lieutenant Bruce A. Guth** is a 21 year veteran of the Fairfax County Police Department. His present assignment, for the past eight years has been as Homicide Section Supervisor, Major Crimes Division of the Criminal Investigations Bureau. After 10 murders and three serious injuries, the "Sniper" suspects were arrested and the Attorney General of the United States decided they would be tried first in Virginia. 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt Guth was put in charge of the "Prosecutorial Task Force" located in Centerville, VA. What makes this task challenging is the coordination of efforts and managing the personnel involved among the Fairfax County Commonwealth Attorney's, FBI, Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms, U.S. Secret Service, numerous local law enforcement agencies such as Wash. D.C., Prince Georges, Montgomery Counties, Prince William, Spotsylvania and Hanover Counties in Virginia. A measure of success is the fact that the Commonwealth has faired well in all motions and related court hearings. He is truly an effective manager of diverse personalities, groups of Detectives and mountains of information.

**On May 18<sup>th</sup>**, Fairfax Resolves conducted a grave marking that has National prominence. **Dr. James Craik** was the personal Physician for George Washington and was at the bedside of both George and later Martha as they departed this earth. The location was the **Old Presbyterian Meeting House, Alexandria, VA**. Mr. Jim Randall, newly

hired Executive Director of NSSAR represented the National Society and the Craik Family from Louisville, KY, direct descendants of Dr. Craik. There were approximately 30 Compatriots, wives and interested by-standers who attended the marking. A video-tape was made of the proceedings and is available from either Larry McKinley or William Youngs. The Craik family has already responded with a most gracious thank you; the tape and entire proceedings have been sent to the President General and Executive Director of NSSAR.

Fairfax Resolves Chapter has a very energized recruitment program to gain new members. During the past 6 months I have helped four prospective members complete their application forms and supporting documentation. The application of **Mark Chester of Clifton** was approved by NSSAR in May and at the September meeting, Mark will receive his certificate and pin. The application of **Dr. David Holly** will soon be forwarded to VASSAR Registrar and we hope he too can receive his certificate and pin in September.
