

Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th of June 1832.

State of Kentucky } ss.
Buckner's County }

On this 20th day of November 1832. personally appeared before the Justices of the Buckner's County Court now sitting Samuel Newby a resident of Harbin County near the Buckner's line in the State of Ky. aged about 43 years who being duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832. that he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year 1778 as well as he now recollects in Capt. Newby's company in the Light Infantry in the

Virginia Regiment of the Virginia line and served under the following named Officers
He resided in the County of Loudoun Va. & in the winter of 1778 he enlisted with Capt. Newby's Ward a recruiting Officer for & during the war. He was placed in Capt. Newby's company - he marched on to Philadelphia & joined the main Army under the Command of Genl. Washington. He staid in that Section about 2 months - when a large portion of the Army marched to the South under the Command of Genl. Greene, we marched through Pennsylvania Virginia many landed in North Carolina were stationed in Hillsborough Town & remained there about 2 months from there we marched to George Town in North Carolina, from there we marched to Halifax & N. Virginia

I was engaged in the battle of Georgetown
 were defeated by the British - on this
 occasion Henry Wagon Col. John Washington
^{of the Michael of the South} Col. Rodolph
 & Col. Harry were commanders
 from there we marched to the Staw
Spring - I had a battle with the British
 I defeated them & took about 800 prisoners
 from this we marched to a place
 called 96 I had a skirmish & the British
 surrendered the fort. I went to a place
 called the Block house near
Charleston say 5 or 6 miles - we marched
 to Charleston S.C. The British left to
 went to Wilmington ^{S.C.} as I understood
 we remained at near Charleston
 about 3 or 4 months were discharged
 at that place, I rec^d a written

discharge from Col. John Washington
 the year having passed - he served the year & a month
 as I now believe - but have lost the
 discharge. I hereby relinquish every claim
 whatever to a pension or an annuity
 except the present and he declares
 that his name is not on the pension
 Roll of any agency in any State.

 he resided in London City & was
 well acquainted with the name
 named James R. Aubrey - He served one
 year on the ^{town} in the north with me in
 the year 1777 & when he returned he
 enlisted in the United States army

as I understand ^{of} ~~the~~ ^{the} war
started out in the Army & had gone
as he believes more than three years
when he returned which I think was
after the war was over he had on
his Regimentals - I have been
acquainted with him many years
in London & after that time in
this State about 20 years - & he has
generally been reputed to be a
soldier of the Revolution & I have
no doubt he served as he states
